REUBEN FENTON (1819-1885). Reuben E. Fenton was Governor of New York State from 1865 to 1869. He also served in the US Congress (1853-1864) and US Senate (1869-1875). As one of the founders of the Republican Party, he was a close political associate of Abraham Lincoln. 1865, New York. Certificate of Indebtedness. 8 3/4" x 4 3/4". Ornate left border. Signed by Fenton as Governor and Commander-in-Chief. Red pen cancellation slightly affects Fentons signature otherwise very fine.

JOHN C. FREMONT (1813-1890). Explorer; Politician; Union general in the Civil War. Fremont, a man of many talents and interests, had a number of colorful and controversial careers. An explorer of considerable repute, he is frequently

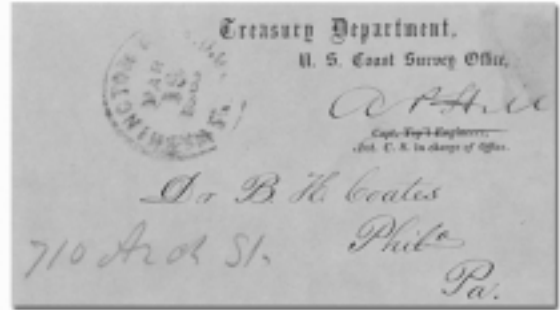
referred to as "The Pathfinder," a nickname he acquired as a result of his exploration of western America, primarily the area between the Rocky Mountains and the Pacific Ocean. 1868, Texas. 8" x 5 1/4". Union brigadier general leading divisions of the 12th and 20th Corps, having served in the Mexican War; governor of Kansas Territory; first mayor of San Francisco; postwar governor of Pennsylvania. Partly printed DS as governor. 1 page, large folio. Philadelphia, June 8, 1871. Land patent of over four acres to Frederick Frailey, President of the Schuylkill Navigation Company of "a certain tract of land situate in North Manheim township, Schuylkill County...." AMBROSE P. HILL (1825 - 1865). American soldier, Confederate Major General during the Civil War. Killed at Petersburg shortly after Grant's final assault. LS. 1 page. 5" x 8". Washington, D.C., March 15, 1861. A very rare and highly unusual partly-printed letter on blue Treasury Department, U.S. Coast Guard Survey Office letterhead. Free Franked "A. P. Hill" on the attached integral address leaf. Franked by Hill while still serving in the United States army and postmarked after Hill became a Colonel in the Confederate States army. To Dr. B. H. Coates, Phila., Pa.; "Dear Sir, I send to the Post Office this day under my frank, addressed to you, a copy of the Report of the Superintendent of the Coast Survey for the year 1859. As there are frequent complaints of failure to receive Documents entrusted to the mail, I take this means to advise you of the book being forwarded; so that, if not received in due time, you may, by inquiring at the Post Office, ensure its reception. Very respectfully yours, W. R. Palmer, Capt. Top'l Engineers, Asst. C. S. in charge of Office"

From November 1855 to October 1860, Hill served as a member of the U. S. Coast Survey, having previously served in the Seminole and Mexican Wars. He married Kitty Grosh Morgan in May 1859, sister of John Hunt Morgan, renowned Confederate leader. On March 1, 1861, just before this document was postmarked, Hill left his post as a Union soldier in the Army to become a Confederate Colonel, the war beginning just over a month later with the shelling of Fort Sumter on April 12, 1861. Fighting to earn the rank of Lieutenant General, Hill commanded one of the three corps of General Lee's army, leading the attack that started the Battle of Gettysburg. A highly unusual and rare free frank completed while the Union was collapsing and America's soldiers were choosing sides. Couple of minor fold separations.

As a soldier in the 14th Army Corp in his second enlistment, however, he participated as an assistant surgeon in the Tullahoma operation, Chickamauga, Chattanooga, the Atlanta Campaign, the March to the Sea and the Carolinas Campaign.

LT. ALBERT A. POMEROY**

A fine group of 45 war dated documents, around half of which are letters, from the retained civil War papers of Lt. Albert Pomeroy. In October of 1861, Pomeroy enlisted as a private in McLaughlin's Cavalry Squadron of Ohio, was then transferred into the 5th Ohio Cavalry, and ended the war as an officer and recruiting agent. This archive is almost certainly Pomeroy's personal papers from the war. Pomeroy was relatively old for the service, apparently approaching middle age, as he had a son that was born on 1845. Judging from the content of these documents, Pomeroy's experience and steadiness apparently led his superiors to rely on him. Within the group there are a number of retained copies of letters in which Pomeroy attempts to resign, citing his advanced age for the service and his wife's failing health. His superiors found him to be too valuable to let him go, and within the archive are a number of letters from Pomeroy's superiors, particularly Major Rice, the Commander of the cavalry Squadron, refusing to let him go on these grounds. Pomeroy was quickly promoted, first to sergeant and then to Lieutenant As a Sergeant in McLaughlin's Cavalry Squadron Pomeroy was given a number of difficult and undesirable, yet essential tasks, including rounding up deserters and arresting troublesome soldiers. Included in the group are individual and group passes, requests from enlisted men for furloughs, lists of deserters, and notes from Pomeroy's superiors giving him authority to carry out his assigned tasks. A particularly interesting example is the following note which Pomeroy was instructed to deliver to an errant cavalryman, which reads: "Sir: If you do not intend reporting yourself in person at camp or are arrested and brought in, you will hand over to Sgt. G.W. Pomeroy Sqn. Cav. O.V. W.S.A., the pistol, sword and all the accouterments belonging to the U.S. Government in your possession, & this will be your voucher for the same....". After being promoted to Lieutenant, Pomeroy was assigned the Job of Recruiting officer, which he performed excellently, for here is a letter of recommendation from a provost Marshall stating that Pomeroy was recruiting ten men a week! A won would expect, there are a number of documents relating to recruiting, such as lists of recruits, payment for their transportation, etc. Last, there are a number of items relating to Pomeroy's discharge, including his "Eagle discharge", and showing that at War's end he was back with his unit in the Carolinas. An interesting group, worthy of more research. On average all the documents and letters are very good to fine condition.

Bush did not dissent and Nash was talking particularly for Bush at the time. I told him I did not approve of whisky drinking every day or any day when Bush said 'of course nobody defends it.' Hough is honest, sober, indefatigable for the right - always - true to his friends - but has not so much speech making ability as Bush...The Ratification meeting today is a great fizzle - it is difficult to ratify both the Platform & [the Democratic nominee] McClellan's letter of acceptance." A fine letter discussing Civil War era politics, including a mention of Lincoln's 1864 opponent, George McClellan. The letter is in very fine condition.

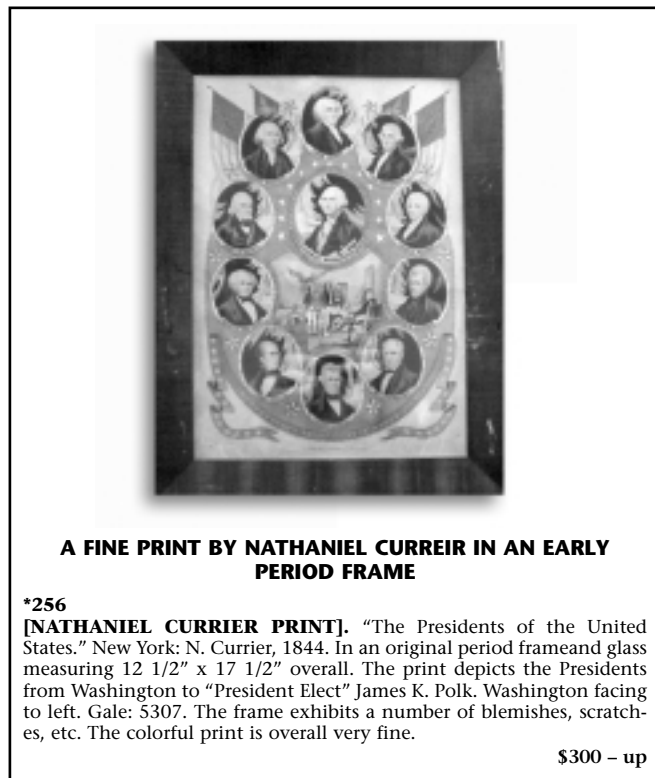

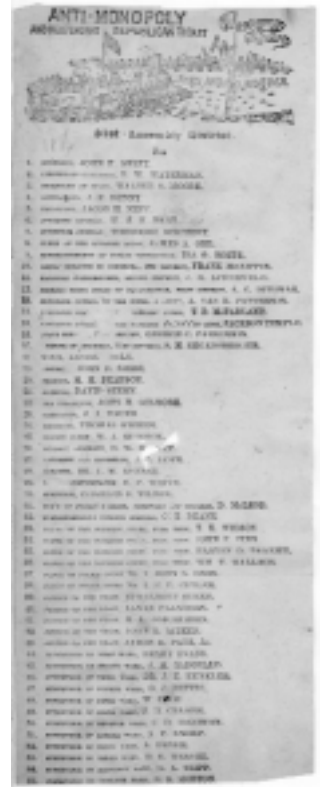

Early horse racing in America was begun by Thoroughbred racing in New York has a long and fascinating history, not unlike the history of the state itself. In colonial times, horse racing was an exciting diversion for the citizenry and races were often run on the "Hempstead Plain"; now the site of Belmont Park. One of New York's first governors, Richard Nicolls, established the country's first racetrack, Newmarket, on Long Island. Scores of other tracks followed, especially on Long Island and in the boroughs of New York City. In colonial America, races were informal affairs, generally match races between two horses occurred over fields or dirt streets of the first settlements. However, racing on a track was already a well-established tradition in England when the colonists first came to America. The first race course in the State was established in 1665. In fact, historians of the period have noted that one of Governor Nicolls first official acts upon assuming office in 1664 was to lay out a mile race course on Long Island at Hempstead Plain (present site of Garden City). He named it Newmarket after the British course. Fortuitously, Long Island contained a long, broad, grass plain, which was ideally suited to racing. The establishment of many others followed: Newmarket II, Washington, Ascot Heath (where the British raced during the Revolution), and Beaver Pond. Manhattan was home to several early tracks, among them Harlem (near Murray Hill), Church Farm (west of Broadway near Besse), Greenwich (north of Church Farm near Greenwich Lane), and Maidenhead (near Delancey Street). Staten Island had the Vanderbilt track. Union Course on Long Island, which opened in 1821, was one of the country's most famous tracks because of its first "skinned" (dirt) track. It was the model for tracks of the future. Also during this period, Gravesend on Long Island began operations and later, in the 1870s and 1880s, Brighton Beach and Sheepshead Bay on Coney Island were established. Tracks were also running in Albany, Poughkeepsie, Centerville (Long Island), Saratoga, and Buffalo.

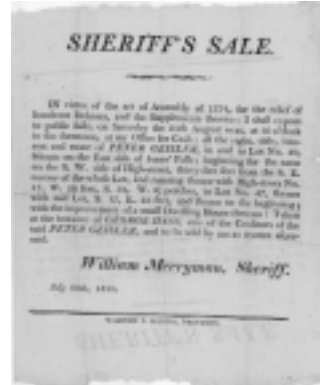

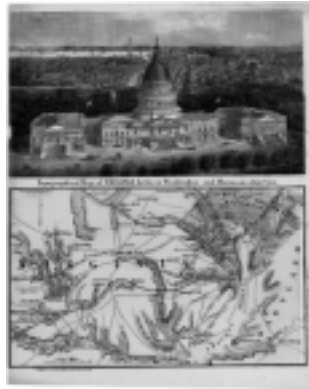

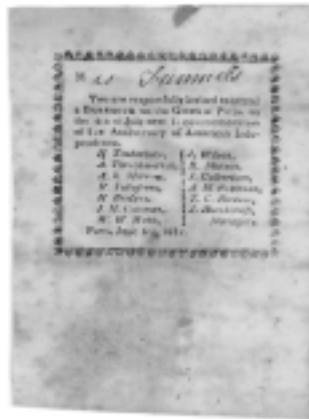
